THE MINERAL INDUSTRY OF THE CENTRAL AFRICAN REPUBLIC

In 2016, the Central African Republic remained in a state of civil unrest. As such, the production of mineral commodities—notably, diamond and gold—represented a largely unmeasurable part of the economy. The legislative framework for the mineral sector in the Central African Republic is provided by the Mining Code of 2009, law No. 09–005A. Data on mineral production are in table 1. All diamond and gold production was from

artisanal mines located throughout the country. ²In addition to the commodities listed, clay, quartz crystals, and sand and gravel may have been produced in the Central African Republic, but available information was inadequate to make reliable estimates of output.

⁴The Central African Republic was under a temporary suspension from the Kimberley Process Certification Scheme and had not traded in rough diamond since 2013. In 2013, 118,946 carats was exported before May 23, when the suspension was put into effect, and during the remainder of the year, 32,906 carats was stored. Production numbers for 2014 through 2016 are only for carats stored, as any illegal trade of diamond was not measured.
