

EXPLANATION

NON-FEDERAL COAL—Land for which the Federal Government does not own the coal rights.

COAL LEASE (Coal Lse.)—An area of Federal coal lands in which the Federal Government has entered into a contractual agreement for the development of the coal deposits.

STRIPPING-LIMIT LINE—Boundary for surface mining of coal bed (in this quadrangle, the 500-foot-overburden isopach). Arrows point toward the area suitable for surface mining. Recovery factor of 95 percent within that area in this quadrangle.

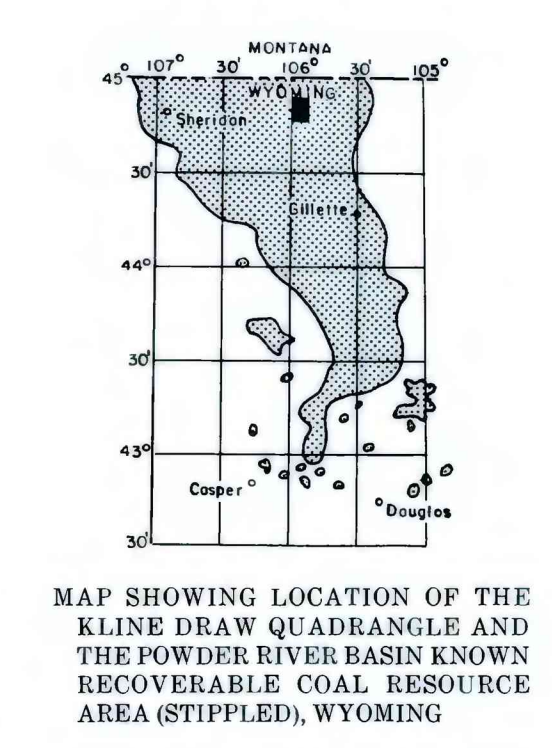
