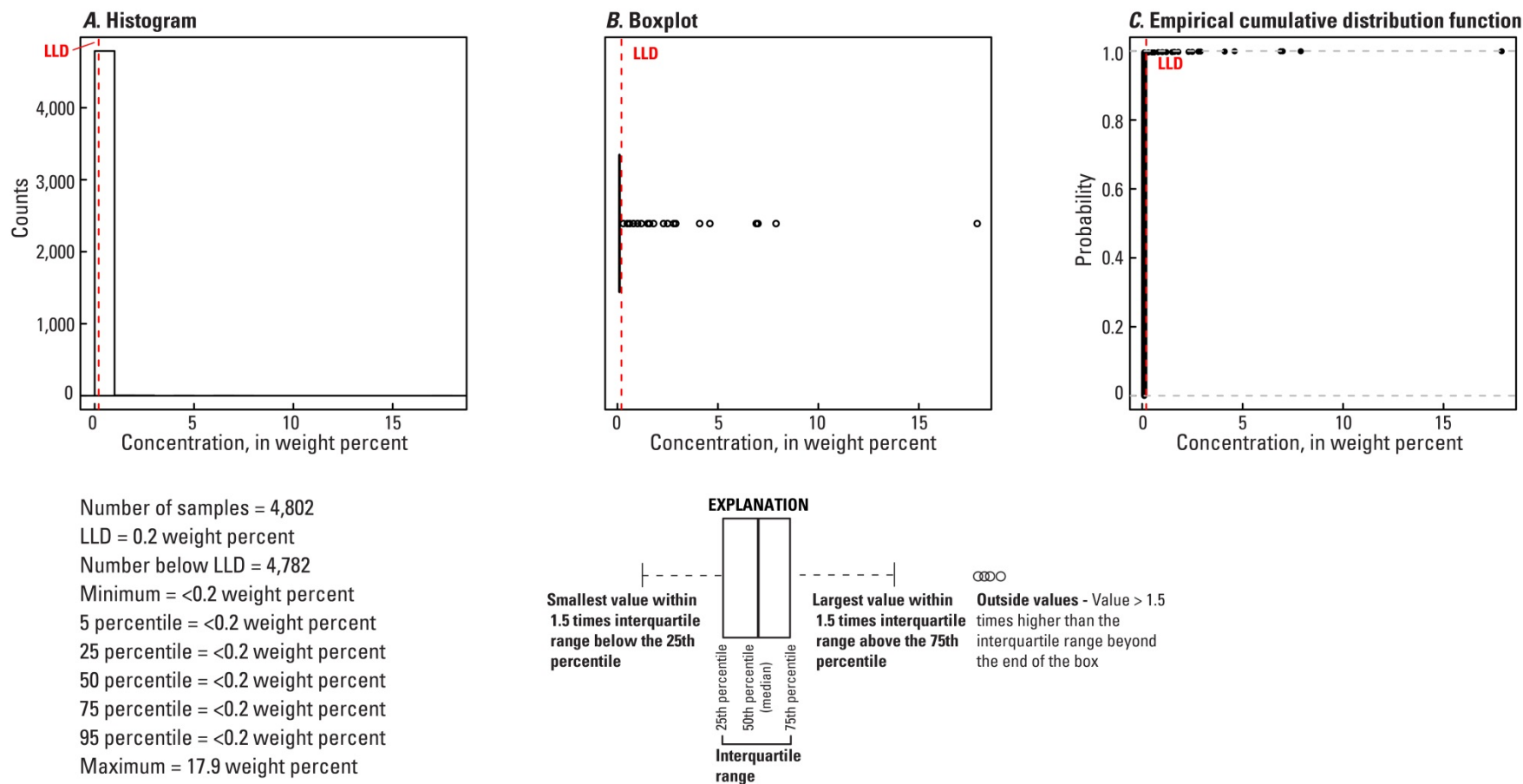


Figure 178. A, Histogram and summary statistics; B, Boxplot; C, Empirical cumulative distribution function; and D, Distribution of serpentine in the soil A horizon, conterminous United States (LLD, lower limit of determination; wt. %, weight percent).

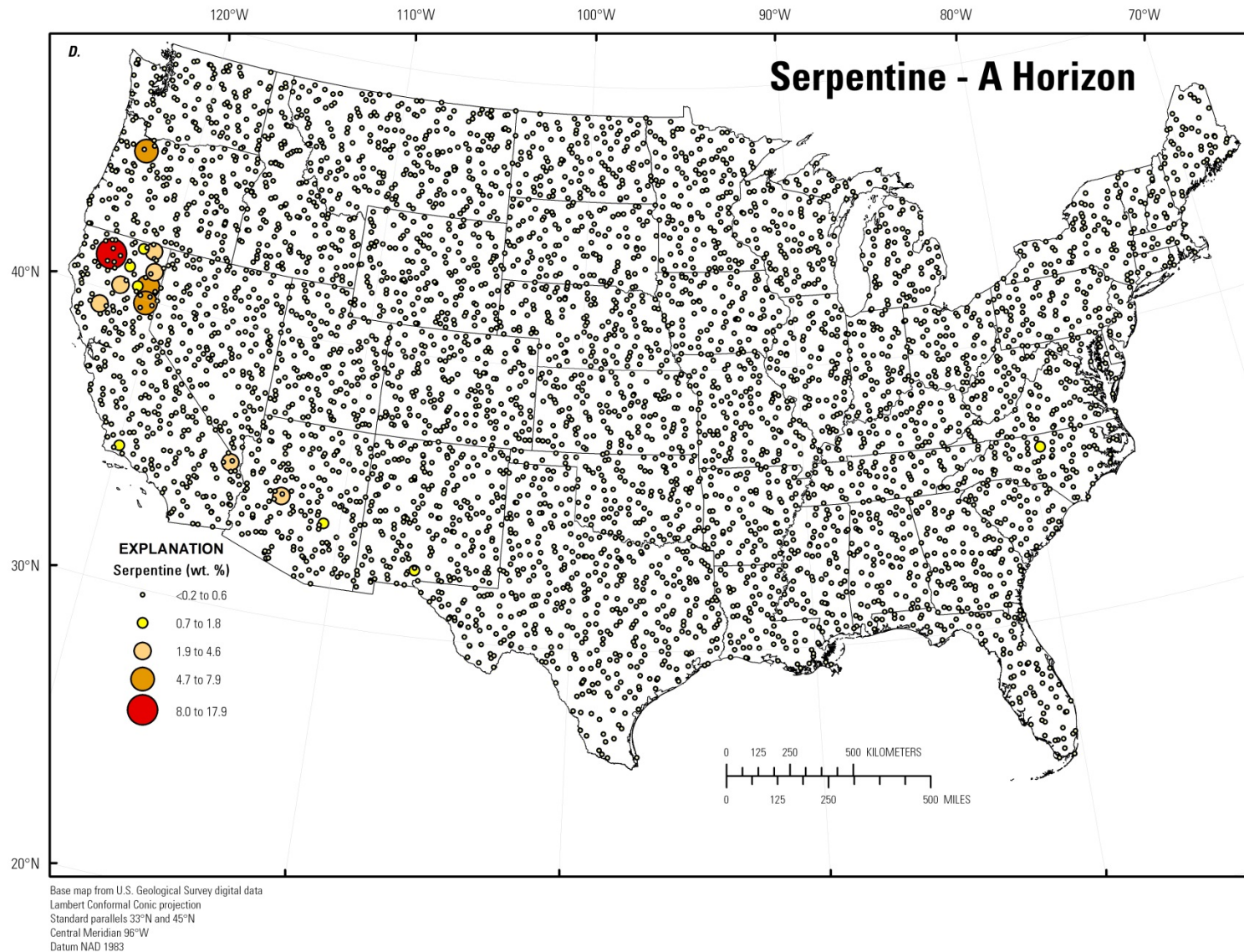


Figure 178. A, Histogram and summary statistics; B, Boxplot; C, Empirical cumulative distribution function; and D, Distribution of serpentine in the soil A horizon, conterminous United States (LLD, lower limit of determination; wt. %, weight percent).—Continued

Serpentine in soil C horizon

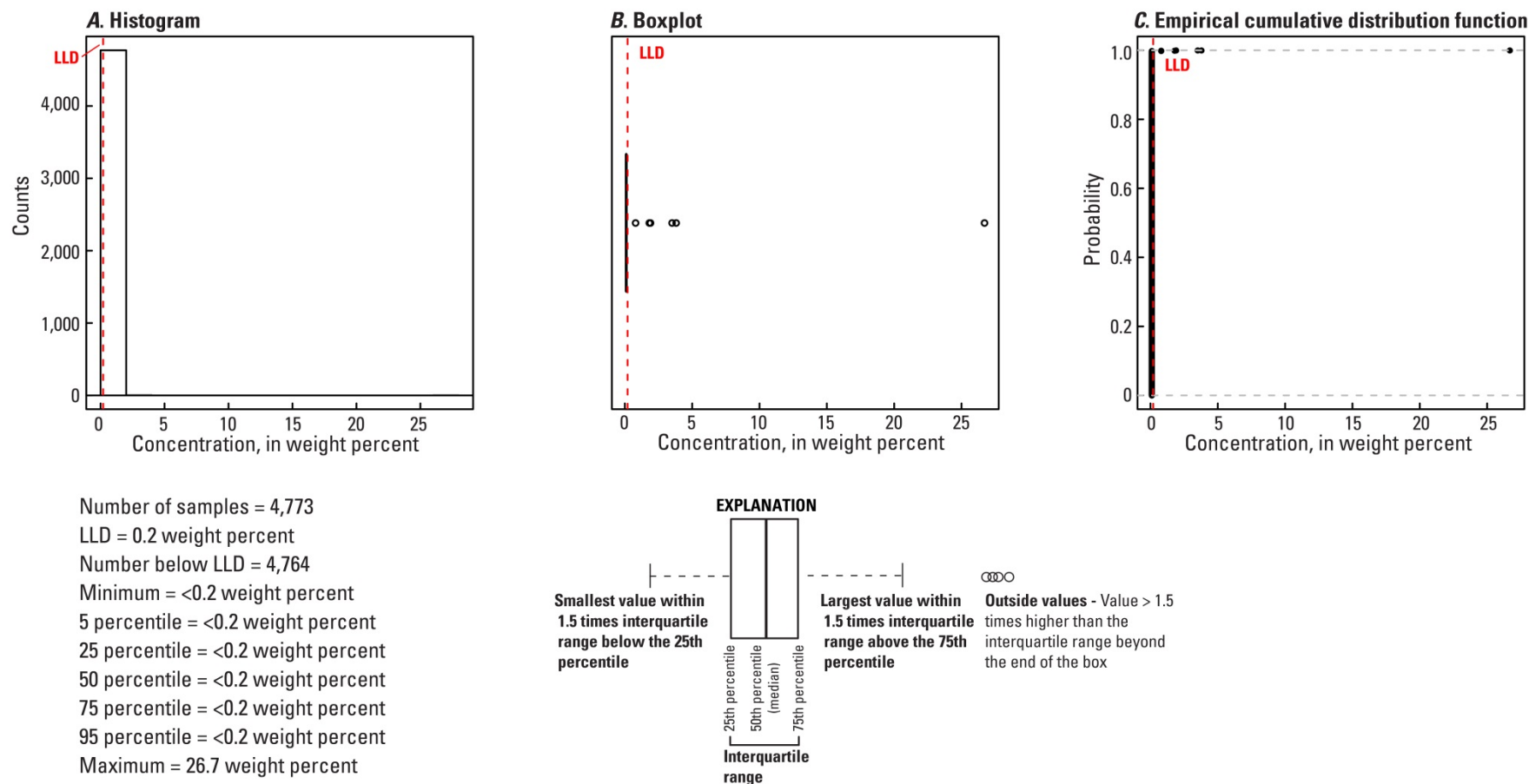


Figure 179. A, Histogram and summary statistics; B, Boxplot; C, Empirical cumulative distribution function; and D, Distribution of serpentine in the soil C horizon, conterminous United States (LLD, lower limit of determination; wt. %, weight percent).

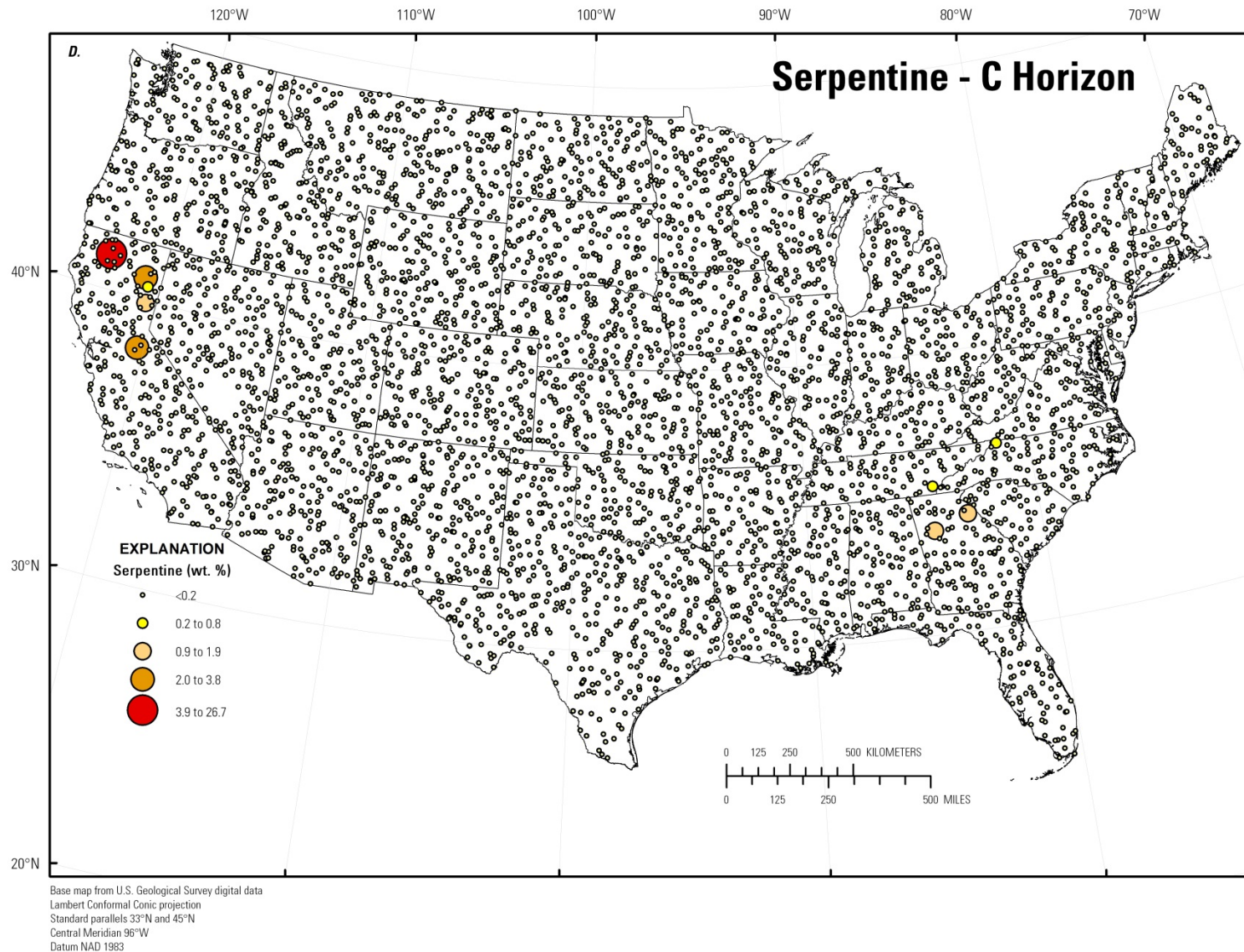


Figure 179. A, Histogram and summary statistics; B, Boxplot; C, Empirical cumulative distribution function; and D, Distribution of serpentine in the soil C horizon, conterminous United States (LLD, lower limit of determination; wt. %, weight percent).—Continued
